

FUNDING NONPARTISAN CIVIC ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

Advocacy groups in general have learned that the most powerful way to conduct issue advocacy and nonpartisan public education is through direct person-to-person contact. Beldon saw an opportunity to provide environmental advocates with more sophisticated tools that would allow them to engage in this kind of permissible outreach.

Here's what we learned:

- 1. Consult advocacy funding guidelines. Foundations have considerable leeway to fund 501(c)(3) organizations to conduct nonpartisan voter outreach, education and mobilization. - 3. Support strong coalitions that allow groups to develop a common agenda and coordinated strategies, while also facilitating cost-effective sharing of resources and sophisticated tools.
